Patriots Buried In Blair County

CONCLUSION

The following list is the second half of the roll of Patriots of the American Revolutionary War who have been interred in the soil of Blair County. The first half appeared in Newsletter #3, 1993.

As noted in the previous newsletter, the names in bold face denote individuals who were residents of Bedford County prior to the war, served in the Patriot forces, and then continued to reside here until their deaths. The war service records of the majority of these individuals have been properly verified. The names and data enclosed within parentheses denote individuals for which I have not yet found accurate service references. BRITISH/HISSIANS BURIED IN BLAIR COUNTY

There are three individuals whose remains lie in the ground of Blair County who were Hessian soldiers, fighting for the British during the Revolutionary War. Their names are included in this list in order to note that they were not Researchers in the past have sometimes erroneously honored them as being Patriots. They are as follows:

Born: Died: Buried in Lower Cemetery, Roaring Spring, PA. Service unknown.} KASPAR DILLINGER Born: 25 April, 1759 Died: 1838 Buried in Rebecca Furnace Farm Cemetery, on Tussey

Mountain near Fredericksburg, PA. Served as a regular in the Lieb Company of the ErbPrinz Regiment. In October, 1781 Kaspar Dilling(er) was captured at Yorktown and, as a prisoner, was taken to a POW camp at Frederick, Maryland. In May, 1783 as he was being transported to New York City (then still held by the British), Dilling escaped. At no time between May and November of 1783 did he join the Patriot forces.

{FREDERICK SINGER Resided in Greenfield Township; and buried in Freedom Township on his Born: Died: farmstead. Service unknown.}

Let tyrants shake their iron rod, And slavery clank her galling chains; We fear them not, we trust in God-New England's God for ever reigns.

Howe and Burgoyne, and Clinton, too, With Prescott and Cornwallis joined; Together plot our overthrow, In one infernal league combined. When God inspired us for the fight,
Their ranks were broke, their lines were forced;
Their ships were shattered in our sight,
Or swiftly driven from our coast.

The foe comes on with haughty stride; Our troops advance with martial noise; Their veterans flee before our youth, And generals yield to beardless boys.

The foregoing ballad/hymn, *Chester*, was written by William Billings and appeared in published form circa 1778. It became one of the most widely sung of all Revolutionary War period songs.

HERALDIC REGISTER

Heraldry began as a system of insignia which, when applied to a banner, shield or clothing would identify the bearer. Instituted originally as a means of identification for warring factions, heraldry eventually evolved into a system by which descendants of a particular individual (who had distinguished himself in some way and was granted a coat of arms) could identify themselves as kinsmen of that individual. The recipient of an heraldic insignia or coat of arms was usually a nobleman or hero in battle.

This REGISTRY has been inaugurated in order to establish an heraldic system to honor our *Revolutionary War Patriot* ancestors. They, through their patriotic endeavors, were America's true noblemen and they deserve to be honored by the age-old practice of heraldry. The descendants of those Patriots deserve to benefit from the recognition that heraldry inherently accords.

Any person who can trace his/her direct lineal descent from a Patriot of the American Revolution may be eligible to be included in the *Register*.

Most countries, except the United States of America, have had or currently have a system of heraldry to honor their national heroes. The United States of America never had any such heraldic system other than hereditary societies such as the DAR and the Sons of the American Revolution. Despite the fact that both of those societies are founded upon principles which include honoring our ancestral heroes of the Revolutionary War, the identity of the individual Patriots become blended together into a shared (and, as a consequence, homogenized) identity ~ and that shared identity is symbolized by the S.A.R. (or DAR) Insignia. The Insignia is really nothing more than an Heraldic Achievement, commonly referred to as a "Coat of Arms", carrying with it all the symbolism and meaning that an Achievement would.

My intentions with the establishment of this *Patriots of the American Revolution Heraldic Register* is to recognize the individual Patriot as one of our true national heroes. The issuance of an heraldic achievement to the Patriot will honor him (or her) and his (or her) descendants in the more personal manner that traditional heraldry has always been based upon.

A secondary purpose of this project is to establish a formal registry for *America*. So many Americans take pride in their *European* ancestral heraldic heritages. It is time that an American system be established to honor the true creators of the United States of America.
