On this 10<sup>th</sup> day of March 1834 before  
the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in the said County personally  
appeared Jacob Boyer, a resident of Beaver Township  
in the County of Bedford & State of Pennsylvania aged eighty  
two years & upwards, who being first duly sworn according to  
law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order  
to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7<sup>th</sup>  
1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the  
following named Officers, and served as herein stated.  
On the first of July 1776 he was drafted as one of the militia  
of York County Pennsylvania, from which County he marched  
on a tour of two months under Captain John Wright, Lieutenant  
John Morgan, & Cob. Michael Sloope, That they marched from  
York County to Philadelphia, when they were put on board  
a Sloop & sent to Trenton, whence they marched to Amboy  
and from Amboy to Elizabeth Town. When their two months  
were about to expire when they marched to Newark, and  
enlisted into the flying camp. When applicant joined the  
flying camp their officers so far as he recollects them were  
Capt. John Ewing, Major Bayle, Cob. Sloope & Longadar  
Genl. James Ewing, - That from Newark they were marched  
to Bergen town opposite to which the British Fleet was then  
laying, That they were marched from Bergen town up the  
Hudson River to the site of Fort Lee which this applicant  
assisted to build. That they remained at Fort Lee until  
a few days after the capture of Fort Washington when  
they were ordered by Genl. Washington who commanded in  
person to evacuate the Fort, which they did after having  
spiked the cannon, and leaving in it all their baggage  
That from Fort Lee they marched across the Hackensack  
river & destroyed the bridge after them over which they  
had marched. Applicant remembers hearing seen the  
British light-horse riding up & down the opposite side of  
the river, trying to get over to them but they could not
