Dear Sire

Reference is made to your letter relative to John Helliday, a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

The data which follow were obtained from the papers on file in Revolutionary War pension claim, 3,39706, based upon the military service in that war of John Holliday.

John Holliday was born November 26, 1749. The place of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown but his father died in 1796.

While residing in Bedford County, Pennsylvania, John Holliday was commissioned June 25, 1775, second lieutement in Captain Rebert Cluggage's Company, Celonel William Thempson's Pennsylvania Rifle Regiment, marched to Boston and was in a small skirmish near that city: semetime during the winter fellowing, he was commissioned first lieutement in same company and regiment: August 26, 1776, was commissioned captain and served as such officer in Celonels Edward Hand and James Chambers' First Pennsylvania Regiment until April, 1778, when he resigned his commission. Captain Holliday's brother, James Holliday, was first Mieutement in his company and was killed at the battle of Brandywine. Captain Holliday was in the battle of Brandywine. Captain Holliday was in the battles of Long Island, White Plains, Tremton, Princeton, Brandywine, Paoli, Germantown and White Marsh; also in a skirmish at Mile Square, and wintered at Valley Forge.

The soldier gave as his reason for resigning his commission that he wished to assist his father, who, with his family, was then residing in Frankstown Township, Bedford (later Runtingdon) County, Pennsylvania, on the frontier. A station was kept at the house and in order
