Reference is made to your letter relative to James Hight, a soldier of the Revolutionary Way.

The data which follow are obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, R. 5060, based upon his military service in that war.

James Hite was born February 24, 1751, place not stated.

While a resident of Hunterden County, Her Jersey, he enlisted, served one menth as private in Captain Philip Hetlin's or Metlen's New Jersey Company and was in an engagement with the British near Ambey; later, he enlisted and served one menth as private in Captain Francis Locks's New Jersey Company and was in the battle Af Milambethtown. Sems years later, he moved from Hunterdon County, New Jersey, to Masten, Pennsylvania; he enlisted there under recruiting efficer, Captain Head, and served between two and three years. He stated also that he was in the battles of Trenten and Thite Harsh, was in vinter quarters at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, was in the battle of Homesuth and served until "peace was made"; he specific dates during this service were given.

Re moved from May Jersey to Carlinle, Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, thence to Juniota County and from there to Huntington County, Pennsylvania.

On Jenuary 19, 1841, he applied for pension on account of the above services, then a resident of Henderson Township, Huntington

County, Ponneylvenia. His claim for pension was not allowed as he failed to furnish proof of service as required by the pension law.
