On this eighteenth day of April in
the year of our Lord one thousand
eight hundred & thirty three, personal-
ly appeared in open court, before the Honorable Thomas Burnside
Esq; President, and his Associates, Judges of the Court
of Common Pleas in and for the said County of Huntingdon
now sitting, George Varyant a resident of Shirley town-
ship, in the County of Huntingdon and State of Penn-
sylvania, aforesaid, aged eighty years, who being
first duly sworn according to law, doth on his
oath make the following declaration in order
to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed

June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States
under the following named officers, and served as
herein stated, viz; That at the township of Barn in
the county of Bedford (now Huntingdon county) in the state
of Pennsylvania, he enlisted in the company of Capt
Sam'l Davis and marched some time in the month of
December in the year one thousand seven hundred
& seventy six, in said company which was placed in a
Battallion which was commanded by Colonel John
Piper, to Princeton in New Jersey, that the command-
ing officer at said place was General Putnam, that
the troops to which he belonged were engaged in several
skirmishes with the British whilst he lay at said
place, and that he was one of a body of men who
marched from said place under the Command of Co-
lonel Smith, and took Bennetts Island from the
British, that the time of his service in the Jerseys
at said period was not less than three months,
and that he returned again to the said county of
Bedford some time in the Month of March or
April following. That some time in the summer
or fall of the same year, one thousand seven hundred &
seventy seven, the Indians becoming very troublesome
on the frontiers, he at the said county of Bedford a-
gain enlisted, or entered into the service of his country
in a company which was commanded by Captain
